



Experts: Why Dallas makes sense for Tesla

t's no secret Elon Musk will speak what's on his mind. And one of his latest statements on Twitter could end up benefitting the Dallas area.

"I do think it's serious," said John Boyd of the Boyd Co., which provides site-selection services. "And I think the experience related to COVID-19 really provided a great pivot point for Tesla to relocate out" of California.

While Musk didn't specify any cities, North Texas would make sense for a potential move, according to Joseph Vranich, president of Spectrum Location Solutions LLC. He said it'd be more likely for Texas to get the headquarters, while Nevada would be more ideal for manufacturing since Musk's Gigafactory for batteries is already there.

"I think there is a reasonable chance that Mr. Musk might indeed do what he has threatened to do, and if so, I think Dallas would be a candidate for the company's headquarters," Vranich said.

While North Texas is home to headquarters of many large companies, the addition of Tesla would be significant. It would bring one of the bigger names

in Corporate America after helping pioneer electric vehicles packed with newer technology. Tesla has a market valuation of more than \$150 billion, making it easily bigger than rivals General Motors and Ford.

The region already can boast of attracting the North American headquarters of automotive giant Toyota to Plano.

"We are closely monitoring the news out of California, but we have no news to report right now." Mike Rosa, senior vice president of Economic Development at the Dallas Regional Chamber.

Boyd pointed out that California has already lost a lot of corporate headquarters, and North Texas has welcome some of those to the region. They include McKesson and Core-Mark Holdings and a planned shift for Charles Schwab.

State and local lawmakers in Texas have a more "pro-business" posture than what Tesla's had in Alameda County, Boyd said.





"Frankly, this is the final straw. Tesla will now move its HQ and future programs to Texas/Nevada immediately. If we even retain Fremont manufacturing activity at all, it will be dependent (sic) on how Tesla is treated in the future. Tesla is the last carmaker left in CA."
